- Love's Pure Light, an Overture to Christmas. On Friday, December 1st at 7:00 and Sunday, December 3rd at 7:30 Piedmont Community Church will present a joyous musical event and festive reception to begin the Christmas season: Love's Pure Light. Steve Main will lead the full choir with concert orchestra in a musical exploration of the many kinds of light that are part of the

Christmas story. It will be magical. You can purchase tickets on-line at the Church website or after Sunday services through December 3rd, or you can make your check to the "Piedmont Community Church", with "Christmas concert" in the memo line, and receive your tickets by return mail. General admission tickets are \$40 each. Reserved/patron seating is \$125.

This event is unique in the Bay Area and is the largest high-quality Christmas orchestral-vocal performance in the East Bay-and it is the only event that includes a reception of this kind, all at a low price. (In comparison, music-only tickets at Grace Cathedral are \$45-60, Chanticleer charges \$51-75, and the San Francisco Symphony performs only a secular program.)

A word about our ticket prices: The actual cost of the event runs about \$80 per person, with nearly 70% going to the orchestra. The difference between receipts and actual costs is funded via patron seating, a foundation grant, and special, individual donations. Any additional shortfall is covered by the music program budget and reserves. At PCC we always pay attention to cost while still providing an exceptional musical evening and reception. We hope you will join in this one-of-a-kind holiday tradition.
