

As we end an old year and start a new, each of us is writing a new chapter in the book that is our life. So, it's hard not to think about words.

What do you recall about all the things you said, or wrote, or heard, or read this past year? And since some of us write down resolutions for the new year, what words might you want to put down on paper? There are plenty of possibilities – of things to do, and not to do.

For me, I want to reconsider how I use my own words. I come to this after having spent Advent and Christmas on a social media

"fast." I didn't look at, or post, anything on Facebook or Twitter, or the rest. At times, I wished I could've given up email and texting too. But, for now, that's more than a bit impractical.

Still, my fast gave me a fresh perspective on the "wordiness" of our world, and of my life. Hemingway wrote, "All our words from loose using have lost their edge." That certainly rings true to me. There are words I am too quick to use, or too slow to hold back. There are words I hear or read – whether from public figures or just regular folks – that bring me down or set us apart. So, it was with a sense of relief that I read something Henri Nouwen wrote in his book, *Bread For the Journey*. It's a caution to consider how readily we consume the words of others, and share our own:

Words, words, words. Our society is full of words: on billboards, on television screens, innewspapers and books. Words whispered, shouted and sung. Words that move, dance and change in size and color. Words that say, "Taste me, smell me, eat me, drink me, sleep with me," but most of all, "buy me." With so many words around us, we quickly say: "Well, they're just words." Thus, words have lost much of their power.

Still, the word has the power to create. When God speaks, God creates. When God says, "Let there be light," light is. God speaks light. For God, speaking and creating are the same. It is this creative power of the word we need to reclaim. What we say is very important. When we say, "I love you," and say it from the heart, we can give another person new life, new hope, new courage. When we say, "I hate you," we can destroy another person. Let's watch our words.

In times to come, may we be a bit more careful, and lot more caring.
